## **Coffee Grounds in the Landscape Project**

Support Texas Garden Club theme of State Regent Kathy Cox- "Moving Forward ... Clean and Green" and recycle coffee grounds as a conservation/environmentally friendly project.

On Monday September 19, Hollywood Cafe Bistro & Owner John Finlay hosted several officers of the A&M Garden Club for a luncheon and donation of Starbucks Coffee used coffee grounds.

"I have read numerous articles about how coffee grounds can enrich soil, assist in

composting, and help grow plants and flowers," said John Finlay, "so I contacted the A&M Garden Club to see if they were interested in our coffee grounds."

The A&M Garden Club can participate with this easy project and use spent coffee grounds in the landscape, by recycling through composting, mixed with mulch, as a soil enhancer, etc. Recycling this great organic resource helps reduce the amount of organics going to the landfill. Coffee grounds can be collected from several local stores. A "Coffee Grounds Go Green" flyer will be available at the next meeting, with information on how to use coffee grounds.

Hollywood Cafe Bistro is located inside the Aggieland Premiere 16 Cinema in Bryan, located on the Earl Rudder Fwy @ Booneville Rd. Mr. Finlay opened the Hollywood Cafe in March 2011, and has been contributing to the local community ever since.

A huge "**Thank You**" to the following A&M Garden Club members for excellent help during the Landscape Design School:

Jane Cohen, Kaye Hobbs, Sherry Ellison, Sandra Williams. We had 96 garden club members and master gardeners attend the



school. A&M Garden Club presented 2 door prizes of 10 lbs. of coffee grounds to go along with our conservation/ environmentally friendly project of using coffee grounds in the landscape rather than having them end up in the landfills. Star Bucks is currently supplying coffee grounds.

#### Coffee Grounds to Share

The club has an ongoing project to collect coffee grounds for composting, mulching, or as a soil additive as a part of Reduce/Reuse/Recycle. Hillary Jessup, Jane Cohen, or Judy Schafer will be happy to supply you with these but you will need to contact them prior to a meeting so they know how much you want and to bring it to the meeting. Alternatively, you could pick up all you need from one of them if it is between meetings and you need coffee grounds.

# **Texas Design Seminars**

This year marked the 20th anniversary of the Texas Design Seminars produced in a cooperative effort by the Benz School of Floral Design in the Department of Horticulture at Texas A&M and Texas Garden Clubs, Inc. It was a bittersweet event, marking a wonderful celebration of successful design experiences and many Design Consultants and Master Design Consultants have benefited from the tutelage of Dr. Jim Johnson who retired in August, 2011. He was assisted by Design Instructor Barbara Baker, and many distinguished committee members including Cathy Cox (TGC President), Renee Blascke (Immediate past NGC President and past TGC President), and our own Idalia Aguilar. Those who attended Renewal XX on August 2-4, 2011, participated in a special Floral Display at the John Haglar Building "Interpretations of The Wizard of Oz". Judges from all over the state, out-of-state, and from the international affiliates participated and had fabulous designs. Course 4 was August 4-6, and featured Angular Designs, Framed Spatial Designs, and Functional Capsule Tables for One. Suzanne Milstead and Heather White were thrilled to be able to participate in the last course as they were permitted to do so as student judges. Texas Design Seminars was a very special hybrid unique to Texas and there is nothing else like it in the NGC. There is a plan to do something special in the future and Bill McKinley, the incoming head of the Benz School, promises to help keep our design teaching available at A&M for Texas Garden Clubs, Inc. The Benz School graciously donates fresh material that is not used to our club for community projects (see below).
