#### MESSAGE FROM MICHELE

At our regularly scheduled meeting on September13th, we heard Dr. Juliana Rangel, from the TAMU Dept of Entomology, discuss honey bee behavior, care, and importance of healthy bee activity in our daily lives. TGC President Sarah McReynolds attended Dr. Rangel's presentation and provided info about native mason bees and the TGC partnership with a mason bee supplier. Judy Schafer shared two mason bee houses that she made of re-cycled materials.

During October and November, a committee chaired by Helen Quinn and Sandy Williams will be working with Dr. Rangel to establish the site for a pollinator-friendly garden at the Riverside Campus Lab. Any club members with knowledge of bee-friendly plants are invited to contribute their expertise to the pollinator-friendly garden project beginning this autumn and continuing into the spring of 2014.

The following is by Carol Smith, TGC Brookwood Community Project Chair: The Brookwood Community is a residential facility and vocational program for adults with disabilities, located in Brookshire, TX, 40 miles west of downtown Houston, with 114 residents and 82 day students. Brookwood provides an educational environment that creates meaningful jobs, builds a sense of belonging, and provide dignity and respect for adults who are functionally disabled (mental/ physical disabilities preventing them from living on their own.)

Enterprises include horticulture, handcrafts, food packaging, mail orders, café, weddings, receptions, & catering. Resident's abilities are matched, ie, design Christmas cards, pour cement pieces into molds, sand pieces of statuary. Others make cuttings of plants, plant plugs, fill pots with potting soil, water and haul flats to green houses. Some serve patrons in the Café or help with greeting customers.

The God-centered facility receives no government funds; instead Brookwood relies on sales proceeds from entrepreneurial enterprises 40%, tuition 40%, and private sector donations 20%. Donations from Texas Garden Clubs go directly to the Horticulture industry for supplies the regular budget can't provide, like raincoats while moving plants to greenhouses during the rain; backpack sprayers to make spraying go faster; 32 gallon trash cans to hold potting soil & move where needed; furniture for the break-room; nursery carts & 2 way radios ... whatever is on their needs list each spring.

Check out the Brookwood Gift & Garden Center and Café ... Best food, best plants, best gift selection anywhere! Browse the 47 green-houses, learn about the educational and work programs, shop, and have lunch - all make a fun pilgrimage for clubs. The poinsettia growing program is very impressive. Christmas Shopping!

The October Checklist by William C. Welch, excerpted from the Southern Living magazine, October 2013 issue, The Texas Gardener's Almanac for the north, central and east:

Buy Bulbs-Established spring flowering bulbs such as snowflakes (leucojum aestivum), hardy amaryllis and narcissus are busily growing fresh roots underground. Buy bulbs of these dependable, heat tolerant selections to plant now. Good choices include 'Grand Primo,' 'Golden Dawn,' and 'Chinese Sacred Lily' narcissus. Snowflakes are easy and will form colonies. Amaryllis are cold hardy in the southern half of the state; elsewhere use them indoors. Try Johnson's amaryllis an old hybrid that has naturalized across the South. Order online at southernbulbs.com.

A&M GARDEN CLUB CONTRIBUTES FLORAL ARRANGEMENTS TO COLLEGE STATION 75th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION EXHIBIT AT GEORGE BUSH PRESIDENTIAL LIBRARY



A&M Garden Club formed in 1936 and was federated in 1937. It was originally formed by the wives of Texas A&M (College at that time) and was thus called A&M Garden Club. College Station was a community but not incorporated until 1938. The club has contributed to many College Station civic projects including cemetery plantings of trees and roses, the Keep Brazos Beautiful Flower Show, and is currently working on the restoration and beautification of the Richard Carter Park, the city's only historical park. The A&M Garden Club has won Garden Club of the Year twice in the past 5 years, most recently in 2013. This year, College Station is celebrating its 75th birthday, and A&M Garden Club was asked to assist in the exhibit which will be at the George Bush Presidential Library in College Station from October 21 through January 4. For the Museum exhibit, floral arrangements were requested to accompany furniture pieces contributed by Linda Harvell, owner of Texas Trading Post, and longtime College Station resident. The pieces were Victorian and turn of the century. Floral arrangements at that time were traditionally arranged and in mass. Due to the nature of the exhibit, only dried or artificial material could be used. Although NGC designs for competition do not permit artificial material, some silk chrysanthemums and greenery were required to complete the designs and provide color. The designers contributing to the exhibit were Suzanne Milstead, Norma Jean Stokes, and Heather White.
