February 21 – Workshop – report from Judy Shafer.

From pre work by Deana and Judy and those who attended the workshop there are 56 blank butterfly fans, 91 4x4 Monarch butterfly tiles and 44 small tile magnets with butterfly stickers attached. Keep in mind the 4x4 tiles are used so some not in perfect condition. There are A&M Garden Club stickers on all. I have applied 1 coat of outdoor Modpodge to the tiles and when dry and weather is warmer so can work outdoors will add a coat of clear plastic spray to ones made yesterday. There are also 72 CD disks with mostly bird pictures on one side and scratch art on shiny side can be used for Earth Day as example of recycling. We had 10 workers, including 2 new members.

MARCH IN THE GARDEN (Average last frost date – March 2nd)

PLAN: Prepare the soil to move mums next month if you divide plants rather than root new ones. Be sure to move each year. Pinch off tops for cutting through May. Fertilize Ligyhtly each month until color shows in the bud. Use Liquid fertilizer to force blossoms..

PRUNE: Finish pruning bush roses and dormant shrubs, and any shrubs that have finished blooming. Crape myrtles may still be cut back form 1/3 to ½ their height, but leave several buds to produce new shoots and to insure flowering. Note: The practice of pruning Crape Myrtles to this extent is now frowned upon by some arborists and experts, and is commonly called "Crape Murder". Some pruning is beneficial to promote better blooming the following season, but take care to prune lightly, to shape the tree, rather cutting right back.

PLANT: Cuttings taken from hardwood shrubs that have been pruned. Divide and reset cannas now. Canna beds need thinning every year for quality blooms. Set out plants of coral vine, dahlia, ferns, gerbera daisy, hibiscus, petunia, verbena. See planted after average last frost should grow.

FERTILIZE & MULCH: Feed all roses, shrubs and plants with quick acting fertilizer to stimulate rapid spring growth. Ageratum and flowering shrubs should not be too heavily fertilized at this time because overfeeding of these tends to produce foliage at the expense of bloom. Do not allow fertilizer to touch stem or leaves of any young plants or seedlings unless it is a foliage fertilizer; it will cause them to scald or rot. Trees may be fertilized this month. After fertilizing, be sure to mulch well, keeping mulch away from trunk. Also apply copperas or aluminum sulfate to gardenias and other acid-loving plants. DO NOT fertilize grass this month as it is still partially dormant and cannot use the food, but the weeds can!!!

SPRAY: Watch for red spider mite, aphids, thrips and bagworms.

WEATHER PROTECTION: Watch for late frosts and protect tender plants. Mulch against a hot, dry summer. Water Plants deeply if needed.

BLOOMING: All hardy annuals, many shrubs, trees and roses, and many bulbs.

Time to scrub the bird baths, clean the feeders, and store them if you don't feed the birds year round. The hummingbirds will soon be here, so make sure you are ready for them! Don't use red food dye – make a solution of 1 part sugar to 4 parts water. Red dye has been known to be toxic, and is not really necessary to attract the hummers to the feeders any more than the red color already built into the design of most feeders these days.
