CS Cemetery

In 1945-46, the A&M Garden Club adopted a five year plan to beautify the College Station Cemetery working with Mr. F W Hensel. Through the years, the Club's chief interest was the maintenance of the historic College Station Cemetery (Methodist Cemetery), established in 1837. Through the efforts of the AMGC, it has become a wildflower and wild bird sanctuary. A rustic light was purchased by the Club and placed at the entrance and red and white roses were planted and maintained along the fence. Today A Texas Historic Marker stands near its entrance. Preview of Sep 8 Presentation at 10:30 am

John and Helen Baines provided a summary in advance so that you can tell other gardening friends and anticipate their great presentation.

John and Helen are in Audubon Society, former garden club members and expat Brits. They last presented at our club in 2013 when they regaled us with details about the restoration of the Lost Garden of Heligan, Cornwall, England.

Birds, Flora and Butterflies showcase the exceptional beauty of the Smardale Valley in the Vale of Eden, Cumbria.

The Smardale Nature Reserve, run by Cumbria Wildlife Trust, follows the course of a disused railway line which provides stunning scenery of species rich grasslands, steep wooded slopes and open rolling moorlands.

Starting at a fortified farmhouse with an ancient Pele Tower that warded off marauding Scots, the walk passes through old demesne woodlands with large swards of wildflowers. Birds and rare butterflies and red squirrels are attracted to the varied shrubs and trees lining the old trackway. Conservation efforts include 'pollarding' trees with coronet cuts.

The magnificent Smardale Viaduct, recently restored, standing 90 feet above Scandal Beck is the scenic highlight for ramblers and photographers. Other attractions are old Romano-Saxon remains, old industrial lime kilns and the 18th century packhorse bridge.
